Just a few examples to highlight some initiatives taken by Clubs during the current IW Year.

- A personality development training was conducted aiming at empowering District Officials, Club Presidents and all participants to be successful in life.
- 4 E-cycles were donated to less privileged ladies to travel to earn their living.
- Three looms were donated to support village women in weaving carpets with traditional design and empower them economically, socially and culturally.
- Two prosthetic hands, 1 artificial leg, 3 batteryoperated tricycles, 8 simple paddle tricycles were donated to enable the receivers to be independent and earn a livelihood.
- Sewing machines were also provided in view of self-employment.
- 10 Rickshaws were donated to needy women who received full training so that they could earn a living.

Digital Empowerment of Members A journey to keep connected

In the rapidly changing world of uncertainty that we have been living in for the last two years, it has been a challenge for many Inner Wheel members to meet and connect with others using the traditional forms of meeting. A significant positive for Inner Wheel during the pandemic is that we needed to find a way to keep our members connected while not physically meeting. So technology has become our new friend.



The problems faced by IWNZ are not unique to New Zealand or Inner Wheel – they are issues faced by any organisation:



- How do we know who our members are?
- How can we communicate efficiently with our members?
- How can we keep everyone connected when physical meetings cannot happen?
- How can we do all this work when we are managed by volunteers?

IWNZ began developing their National Strategy some years ago. A strategy is a constantly evolving, living document where issues are addressed, solutions developed, and steps to help reach these goals. **Problem** – How do we know who our members are?

Solution – We created a national database linked to the IWNZ website, www.innerwheel.org.nz. Members each have a personal login to manage their membership profile, opt out of communications, register to attend events and access a members-only portal on the website for resources, discussion groups and members-only events.

Therefore, the IWNZ Website operates as two separate entities:

- the first being for the general public, to showcase Inner Wheel and share what we do and how to become a member,
- the second as a powerful tool for our members a communication database and members resource portal.

Problem – How can we do all this work when we are run by volunteers?

Solution – Our first focus was on procuring funds. Our National

Executive team began applying for local grants to secure funding used to purchase the software applications required and to pay for the professional set up of the database and website. We then secured a second year of funding, which enabled us to contract the services of a part-time administrator who maintains the system and creates the website material, forms, and procedures. She also helps to manage the database and online events.

Problem – how to get everyone on board with the tools?

Solution – Many new tools were introduced to IWNZ. We took it in two-year stages. In 2020-21, we registered IWNZ as a non Profit with Google, which gave us free access to all the **Google Workspace tools.** We registered the domain name iwnz.org.nz and were then able to create an organisation on Google with Administrators that can set up all email accounts and manage these Goggle accounts internally. All National and District position holders had accounts created and instructed to use these in the first year. In addition, Google Meet sessions helped these account holders migrate their previous Gmail accounts to the new system, and they attended online lessons on how to use the new accounts.



Resources and all Inner Wheel business were moved into **Drive to share documents and resources retained for future use**.

It was very timely that we had converted to this system, as our biannual conference was in jeopardy of not happening. The National team took over the running of the conference, with all meetings held via Google Meet online meetings. Google Forms enabled us to **reach out to members to collect information, take surveys, and administer registration forms.**

For the 2021-22 year, all Clubs were allocated Google accounts, expanding the system across the country. At the same time, we launched the new IWNZ website and database and had contracted our part-time Administrator. Having Arielle on hand to reach out to struggling members was a vital and a calming asset to us. Arielle's gentle manner and personal approach saw her making personal contact with many. The use of online meetings to assist some members while also listening to the problems were encountered. Therefore, she created the necessary **troubleshooting and FAQ** section on the website to help others experiencing these issues of most concern.

Change does not always come easy, and in a world where everything was changing and the higher demand of using technology bought with it some fear and frustrations by some. We knew it would not be an easy process to transition everyone over. Still, we took our time, applied care and concern, and held back from instigating the system's full functionality at this moment in time.

Online Events

The other step to getting everyone on board was introducing **two forms of online events.** **IWNZ Day** happens on the 1st of September every year. Members are encouraged to 'Walk and Talk" and share Inner Wheel with their friends. In 2021, IWNZ day fell in the middle of a level four, complete COVID-19 lockdown, so we went online. "Brew in Your Bubbles" was created, and invitations were sent to all members. The ladies "Zoomed" in for a morning tea, sharing a little time for a "walk" as we did a virtual walk in the sunshine. We took a tour of the **country** to check in on our friends from across NZ. We had a **quiz** to guess the logos of charities we support, we told a few stories of lockdown projects and generally had a great time connecting.

At every online event, IWNZ President, Michelle, likes to teach



(A) **Bi-monthly Sunday sessions** are casual, online events on a Sunday afternoon for members to register to attend, log in and take part in conversations, share ideas, meet each other, and even play a few games. They are open to all members within NZ and overseas. These have been fun meetings. In July, we held our first one where the National Governing Body members and associates had an opportunity to introduce themselves and share their roles and IW stories. It helped IW members see who the National team are and realise we are all just members and friendly people.

Members something new. It has been a bit of fun for the members to learn some **"Zoom Etiquette"** such as – how to rename themselves to include their first name and Club name, so members can see where they come from and raise their



Recently we sent **a survey** to all members who have attended these Digital Education Events. Here is a summary of the results:

- Everyone (100%) who attended found the sessions helpful and felt they learnt something new.
- 82% felt empowered to help other members in their Clubs to develop their online skills.
- 95% believe the video recordings are of benefit.
- 86% who responded had attended at least three online events

hand, or share a reaction. Most importantly, to is how to mute and unmute themselves. Members are encouraged to keep their camera on so that they can genuinely connect and see each other.

It was a tremendous honour for IWNZ members to meet IIW President Ebe at their November Sunday Session. In this event, the District Chairmen shared their District projects and talked about how the Clubs in their District manage. We then had a Question and Answer session with IIW President Ebe. It was a unique and intimate experience for members to meet President Ebe. Many members have commented on this


> beautiful experience they had, and they were impressed to realise how much effort she took to read about what is happening in IWNZ and share some of her experiences with IWNZ members.

(B) The second format of online meetings and empowerment of IWNZ members is a **monthly Digital Education series**. Held on the first Wednesday of every month, this series is **recorded and then posted on the IWNZ website and YouTube channel** for others to view at their leisure.



The **topics** include:

- How to use Google Workspace accounts,
- How to log into the website Members tools,
- How to make media submissions,
- An online guide to service records,
- Creating exciting newsletters,
- Using Online Creative Tools,
- Social Media tips and tricks,
- How to write a Press Release,
- How to publicise your Club events,
- Using Google Apps and tools.

At every session, members get a tour of any new developments on the IWNZ website and new resources for their use.



These digital education sessions have played a significant role in empowering the members to gain confidence in using the resources and tools available and help keep the members inspired and engaged in the technological developments. As a result, their popularity is increasing.

With Zoom etiquette and a nonthreatening environment created in the delivery of these events, there has been considerable evidence that these sessions are making a difference and members are using the tools.

Problem: How to communicate with all Members effectively?

Solutions: The development of the new database has also meant that communication tools have expanded for use by IWNZ. For example, regular newsletters can be delivered to all members using the database. In addition, invitations and reminders of online events, online registrations monitored and the ability to send surveys to specific groups of members.

Another effective tool in communication is the use and strength of social media, ease of access to the website and a clear communication plan to ensure effective and timely communications to all members. There are systems for all campaigns to ensure that information is communicated clearly to all members. The social media channels are maintained by the IWNZ media team, who regularly post inspiration and ideas on Facebook and Instagram. Therefore ensuring these pages are active, relevant and engaging.

Summary



Communication vital is to ensuring all Inner Wheel members feel connected, empowered and engaged. We have a **clear strategy**, we have set the priorities of what our IWNZ members want to see happening, and we are **working** together as a team to keep the wheel turning and to keep IWNZ moving forward as we **develop** the skills from within. The process is intentionally careful to ensure all members feel supported at whatever level they choose. It is vital that the older **members are** valued and supported within their Clubs, while others are encouraged to grow and guide the organisation into the next 100 years. We have some more inspiring tools to roll out in 2022 and, in particular, are looking forward to a National Membership March, 'Tickled Pink" campaign. Together, through empowerment, we are evolving as an organisation that supports Strong Women in a **Stronger World**. IWNZ's journey continues....



Stree Shakti App Build • Motivate • Grow

A success story of Inner Wheel in India

The Inner Wheel year 2021-22 started with the International theme "PINK FIRST" given by International Inner Wheel President Ebe Panitteri Martines. She also unveiled a three-year worldwide social theme, "Strong Women, Stronger World". It was a pleasant coincidence then that the President of the Association of Inner Wheel Clubs in India, Saroj Katiyar, also came up with Association Goals "SHEROES" with a clear vision and focus to help women grow. I believe a woman's best protection is the money she earns for herself and financial independence will lead to sustainable growth. A three step plan was made and implemented at national level.

SHEROES and Stree Shakti App

The first letter of SHEROES, "S" stands for 'Stree

Shakti', a Hindi word which means Women Power in English. 'Stree Shakti' is a name of vision for empowering women through entrepreneurship which led to the first step to develop a mobile-friendly App which is named 'Stree Shakti'.

The Stree Shakti App is a one-stop destination to locate all women entrepreneurs in Inner Wheel at a click of a finger. It is an e-directory with the names, contact details, and businesses, products, initiatives of the 'Shepreneurs' a name proudly given by Association President Saroj Katiyar to Inner Wheel women entrepreneurs and thus a great help to them to promote, advertise and sell their products and increase online visibility. Data of approximately 3,500 Inner Wheel women entrepreneurs spread across more than 1,500 clubs in India were collected and made available through this app. It works on

Android and iOS and is available on Google Play Store and App Store for free download. She is motivating 47,000 Inner Wheel members and their families in India to download, use this App and give preference to doing business with an Inner Wheel friend.


A Shepreneur can be searched by any one keyword Name, Club Name, City, Business Classification, District number or Mobile number. For example, suppose you

> are living in Delhi and want to send a cake to your sister on her birthday in Mumbai, you can use the keyword "Baker" or "Cake" to search for an Inner Wheel friend in Mumbai who is in the cake-baking business and then place the order. The added advantage is that you are getting connected to a trusted Inner Wheel member. The Inner Wheel baker in Mumbai can get business from all over India by enrolling for free with the App. You can also connect with local Shepreneurs for your day-to-day shopping needs and who knows it may come with the added benefit from an Inner Wheel friend.

> This App has many uses as it contains vast information. Apart from the business directory of Shepreneurs, it contains information about Inner Wheel, Inner Wheel Objectives, IIW Theme PINK FIRST by IIW President Ebe Panitteri, biodata and photo along with a

special motivating message for Shepreneurs. It also contains detailed information about Association Goals 'SHEROES' hence, doing good branding for the organisation. A special tab for non-Inner Wheel members to collect information if they are interested

Association is also motivating other women entrepreneurs to join Inner Wheel to get free enrolment in the App based directory. This will lead to quality membership development because it is believed that independent women can take up more responsibilities and handle challenges more strongly, thereby contributing immensely to the growth of the organisation.

Webinars for Inner Wheel Entrepreneurs

The second step was to organise a series of webinars and online sessions on embracing the challenges faced in business: ideas, concepts, and insights; how to take advantage of Government schemes, digital marketing, Facebook for business and e-commerce, and Amazon marketing. They have been conducted regularly to increase the knowledge of women, upscale their business and support digital transformation and growth. Association President Saroj Katiyar is inviting the best of people in the country to guide *Shepreneurs* to learn skills and gain knowledge to develop their businesses. Thousands of women are joining and learning to grow their businesses through them and are benefitting.

Exhibitions and marketing

The third and final step is to organise physical and online exhibitions to promote these women entrepreneurs. Clubs are regularly organising exhibitions and promoting them regularly, thereby making them economically self-sufficient.



COURAGE-MAKERS: Look and act wisely

THE MEMBERS OF THE INNER WHEEL CLUBS IN MUNICH have been called courageous by the press. They have indeed become courage-makers and role models for many young women and girls at the Sankt Josef Girls' Secondary School in Schwandorf. The teachers of the school support Inner Wheel members in educating the young women to be more self-confident and independent.

Strong women with courage, civil courage and independent action are a prerequisite for successful and self-confident behaviour and action in society. Education in these aspects does not begin in the workplace but in school.

Such "empowerment" was publicly honoured by the **Munich Inner Wheel Award for Civil Courage**. The prize is endowed with a total sum of 5,000 euros and provides targeted support for activities, workshops, project weeks and extracurricular activities aimed at strengthening their personality and education, to maturity. The prize is awarded every 2 years.

"Look and act wisely": Under this motto, experts were able to provide guidance on how to counter sexual violence against women, but also on how women can help and protect each other.

In Germany, 25% of women are victims of domestic violence. Accordingly, for every 4th woman, her own home is the most dangerous place. Alarming figures, behind which stand individual fates, destinies of women. The students dealt with this problem consciously and in detail in order to draw the attention of parents, classmates and teachers to a topic that is still taboo in many places.

Heroes of the COVID-19 Crisis

When teachers show special commitment even in difficult times and courageously go their own, creative and special ways for the benefit of the children, then this is worthy of appreciation. The Inner Wheel from Munich wrote a letter to 2,250 elementary schools in Bavaria and asked for applications for the Second Munich Inner Wheel Civil Courage Award — to honour those teachers who took measures and initiatives on their own responsibility, to help children and parents during COVID-19. Almost one in three children suffered from psychological problems almost a year after the pandemic, including worries and fears, depression symptoms and psychosomatic complaints. The Inner Wheel members are convinced that it takes committed teachers to strengthen these children.



Empowerment through adversity The courage of a true Inner Wheel woman

Courage, will, security, decision, strength, and faith come to the fore when a situation or condition puts you on the edge and, there are only two ways: get ahead or sink.

The second was not an option for Yves Mariscotti de Caligaris because it would be victimising herself to escape responsibility for her own survival and her ability to do something for the community. For her there was no choice but to show her power.

Here I share the story of a woman who fought through thick and thin to always see a new dawn and share that hope with every person she came across in her life.

Acqui Terme is a town in Italy very close to an extinct volcano and, therefore, popular for thermal water treatments, mud baths and sulphur water. Born on 17 December 1915, Yves Caligaris lived her childhood and youth immersed in an environment of helping others as people came to seek a cure in that corner of the world.

Later, she studied in Nice at a boarding school away from her parents. It was a tough and lonely time for her. After graduating in interior decoration and mastering two languages, she returned to her hometown. It was difficult to get to feel, again, the warmth of home. Nevertheless; it was from her

father that she learned generosity. She attributes her sense of service to him. He would visit a couple of friends who were living in difficult situations. He used to visit them, on his bicycle, with a basket full of fruits and food. This is how she decided to join the volunteer corps of the Red Cross.

She fought with all her might against the customs of the time of negotiating marriage, the payment of a dowry, and heartbreak. Her mother was determined to marry her off to a "good match." But, luck smiled on her.. and she met the love of her life: Piero Caligaris. A man ten years older than her, a very successful transport industrialist, a citizen of the same hometown although he was living in Africa. After overcoming the family vicissitudes, on the one hand the ambitious desire of her mother and on the other, the fear of Piero's father losing the economic support of his son. Finally in 1939, they married and left for Asmara Africa where they would start their new life together.

Yves never imagined the horrors she would see and experience in Africa. Racism, slavery, starvation and asthenia suffered by Africans in the presence of European colonisers and the terrible hostility of the climate. When World War II came, her husband departed to Bombay as a prisoner of the English. She faced the death of her newborn daughter, loneliness, scarcity and poverty; in the midst of danger, insecurity and uncertainty.

Yves was surrounded by death, abuse and struggle, but held on to faith under the shelter of God. From there she drew the strength to move on, and the hope of one day reuniting with her husband.

Faced with the dark outlook and with the support of friends, she launched her own crusade to support Italian prisoners. Service to her fellow citizens filled her mind and heart. She recalled her days at the Red Cross in her native Italy and decided to rejoin the nursing corps to help Italians in concentration camps. Time passed, and she met Piero. They flew to America, lived for a time in New York and later settled permanently in Mexico. Once in Mexico, her servility and experience led her to interact with great personalities and continue with her vocation of service.

Once again, she joined the nursing corps of the Mexican Red Cross. It was then that she got to know about Rotary International and its magic.

Later she would meet Mercedes Velten, the first District Chairman of Inner Wheel District 417 in Mexico and who would encourage her to be a founding member of the Inner Wheel Club of Ciudad de Mexico.

Tireless, enthusiastic and always with a restless heart to help people in need, she came to lead District 417 as District Chairman, and to be worthy of multiple recognitions, among them was the recognition of Margarette Golding for her record of service and for being a woman of extraordinary human power and worthy as an example for many women, who even in the face of adversity can sustain their power.

Fire extinguishers for the longhouses in Sarawak

Empowering womenfolk to safeguard their own homes

It was a warm and sultry day in the interiors of Sarawak on the island of Malaysian Borneo. In a remote village, nestled in this "Land of the Hornbills", the elders sat along the common corridors of their wooden longhouses, each of which is home to 15 households. As they were catching up on the latest village news and watching the little children at play, the mothers were tending to dinner preparations.

Just as a late evening breeze brought a cool respite to the village, a piece of burning ember suddenly tumbled onto the kitchen floor from an unattended wood burning stove, where a young mother had briefly turned away from, to attend to the needs of her crying baby. All it took was a few minutes for the breeze to fan the embers into a flame, and soon, the dreaded shouts of "Api! Api!" or "Fire! Fire!" brought pandemonium to the village. As the womenfolk rushed to draw water from the nearest water source, the fire raged on and by the time the menfolk who were working in the nearby fields were alerted to the fire, all they could do was to watch the fire ravage what was once their home.

A recent news report highlighted that there were a total of **120 fire outbreaks over a span of 5 years between 2015 and 31st July 2020, at longhouses in Sarawak**. Many of the longhouses, especially those located in the rural and interior areas of Sarawak, are wooden structures, housing between 15 to 20 households, if not more. These villages may be several hundred kilometres away from the nearest town with a Fire Station and some are only accessible via dirt tracks or by river.

The causes of the fire outbreaks were reported mainly due to "electrical short circuits, followed by gas equipment malfunctioning, embers, oil lamps and candles", among others. And most of the fire outbreaks that failed to be overcome were noted to occur between 6am and 6pm, when only women and children, and the elderly were at home. We were also given to understand from our interviews with several village heads that there is sadly, a lack of firefighting equipment in these longhouses, and as such, fire outbreaks were more often than not, difficult to contain.



INNER WHEEL'S INVOLVEMENT

"The Fire Extinguisher Project" is an initiative by the three District 331 Inner Wheel Clubs of Kuching, Miri and Sibu in Sarawak which, together with the other Inner Wheel Clubs in Singapore and Sabah, and friends of Inner Wheel have rallied together to raise funds to purchase fire extinguishers for several selected villages in Sarawak.

BENEFITS OF THIS PROJECT

By donating fire extinguishers to the longhouses, Inner Wheel hopes to:

- i. EMPOWER the womenfolk from the villages with the necessary fire-fighting skills, knowledge and equipment to safe-guard their homes and families; and
- ii. give the residents a fighting chance to put out any fire before it gets out of hand.

SELECTION CRITERIA OF THE VILLAGES

- The village of wooden longhouses must be situated in the rural or interior areas of Sarawak.
- The residents must be willing to maintain and service the fire extinguishers annually at their own expense; and
- The residents, including a team of the womenfolk from each longhouse, must be willing to learn basic fire-fighting skills from the Fire Brigade personnel as arranged by Inner Wheel and the respective village heads.

SELECTED VILLAGES

Three villages have been identified for this Project, with Kampung Lebu Kulit being the nearest to the town of Bintulu, which has a fire station.

- a) Kampung Lebu Kulit, Sungai

 - Number of Longhouses 14 blocks, with 15 households

609 households, with a total population of about 5,680 villagers.

TIMELINES FOR THE PROJECT

The Fire Officers have recommended the 9 kg Multipurpose Type ABC Fire Extinguishers for the longhouses, so that the womenfolk will be able to handle them.

Although fundraising efforts are currently ongoing, the first batch of fire extinguishers have been purchased and delivered to the villagers of Kampung Lebu Kulit in early January 2022 to mark INNER WHEEL DAY 2022. It is hoped that all three villages will be fully equipped with fire extinguishers by the end of March 2022, and their "PINK FIRE SQUADS", comprising the womenfolk from each village, not only competent in firefighting skills but empowered to protect the safety of their homes and the wellbeing of their families!



District 381 inks agreement with PBEd and RI 3830 for **YouthWorks PH**

District 381 in the Inner Wheel Clubs of the Philippines, Inc., led by District Chairman Lulu Yambao and Rotary International District 3830 led by Governor Joji Tan, came together to support the training efforts of the private sector-led initiative called **YouthWorks PH**, **a workforce development project implemented by the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) and the Philippine Business for Education (PBEd).**

On 27 October 2021, the agreement was signed by lead clubs— the **Inner Wheel Club of Manila Bay EDSA** President Anna Chan Lao and **Inner Wheel Club of Metro South** President Arlyn Gregorio. This paves the way for the amplification of recruitment and training efforts in the project's flagship programme called **Flexible Training for Work** (FTW). The partnership is committed to providing training subsidies for 50 FTW trainees for the whole duration of the partnership, initially, giving the first 15 trainees a total of PHP 90,000 in training support.

The programme will also identify potential youths, unemployed 18 to 30 years old, who are neither in training nor education. They will then be qualified based on employment requirements of the companies. This is also in partnership with PBEd in YouthWorks PH.

FTW components include **Remote Mentoring and Employability Skills Training**. For a period of two months, trainees are grouped into cohorts of fifteen trainees and are assigned a mentor whose responsibility is to carry out online modules on core skills, such as communication, professionalism, critical thinking and interpersonal skills. The trainees' employability skills are honed using the Skills to Succeed platform through PBEd's partnership with Accenture. Trainees are provided with communication allowance while learning devices are loaned to trainees. The learning devices will be donated to the trainee upon completion of their programme.

The second component is the **Technical-Vocational** Learning via remote mentoring. Trainees can choose to learn through the TESDA Online Programme or be trained on a blended modality for specific sites and/or sectors that allow and/or require face-to-face training. TESDA scholarships are utilised in technicalvocational institutions for some technical-vocational courses. TESDA is the Technical Education And Skills Development Authority, a Philippines government agency. The third component is the **On-the-Job Training with** partner companies. After their technical-vocational learning, trainees are deployed to partner companies to undergo on-the-job training for a maximum of three months. A company who is interested in training the youth signs a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) which includes, but not limited to, the following commitments: (a) shoulder the trainees medical/health checks, uniform and protective garments, and/or logistical-transportation support as they start training; (b) provide each beneficiary with basic accident insurance and daily training allowance not lower than 75% of the regional minimum wage for the duration of the on-the-job training; (c) ensure that the trainees have the necessary tools, instruments, machines and other safety equipment to perform the tasks; (d) PBEd to provide trainees with support for competencies/ skills assessment and certification and other preemployment requirements as may be necessary; and (e) during the course of the training, beneficiaries are considered as trainees and not employees of the partner company. However, the partner company shall prioritise the beneficiaries in hiring should a position become available.

Labvanvitelli Project: business incubation for students

The Inner Wheel Club of Caserta Luigi Vanvitelli, in line with the PINK FIRST priority on empowerment, has decided on a project called "Labvanvitelli". lt is an ambitious project commissioned by the Club, chaired by Club President Maria Colasanti who has been working for several months under the careful guidance of the District 210 Chairman Liliana Del Grosso.

The project consists of setting up a "laboratory" to be activated in secondary schools. The idea is to inform, train and support, free of charge, young people who want to develop an innovative idea and then handhold them in creating their start-up.

It is not an information desk. The school managers of the various institutions involved will be the ones to notify young people's business ideas.

Once the "business idea identification form" is filled in, the professionals in the Inner Wheel Club of Caserta Luigi Vanvitelli (e.g. accountants, architects, engineers, experts in finance, as well as in the legal field) will support the young people in developing their idea through market analysis, feasibility studies as well as drawing up business plans to verify the feasibility of the idea.

The project consists of two steps: the first involves training young people interested in corporate topics and start-up opportunities.The second step will be much more practical where the young people will be accompanied and supported from its establishment up to the end of the first year to ensure its survival.

It is an ambitious project that will extend beyong the current year. At the moment, the Club has drawn up a network agreement which, in addition to the leading institute, includes seven high schools from Caserta and the Province. The agreement is scheduled to be signed at the end of February 2022.



Clubs in District 330 educating and uplifting women

In the 2021-2022 Inner Wheel term, in line with putting women and children first, Clubs have been focusing on the four main areas as espoused by Inner Wheel, one of them being empowerment of women. What exactly does empowerment mean? Empowerment has been defined in several ways, but to me, what stands out is the effort to raise the status of women through greater awareness, which can be acquired through education, literacy and training. An enlightened and empowered woman would then be able to make her own choices and decisions, which previously may have been denied to her; this will then ultimately give her a purpose and direction in her life.

Why has empowerment become such a significant topic of discussion? Many have argued that sustainable development of any country is not possible without gender equality, which currently is largely absent globally due to the lack of empowered women. Many factors contribute to this situation, including economic, social, cultural, psychological, political and racial issues. For example, in the workplace, women face a whole gamut of barriers, like sexual harassment, unjust recruitment practices and lack of career progression, as well as unequal pay for performing the same job as their male counterparts. We hear too many stories of women becoming victims of human trafficking, and other forms of abuse. Something seriously needs to be done to help break this cycle of injustice towards women in so many parts of the world.

The United Nations itself has come up with 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), of which SDG 4 and SDG 5 have a special focus on women. The former is on access to education for all, while the latter focuses on empowering women and girls to achieve gender equality via equal access to health care, education, work, and other vital opportunities. Even though in the current digital era, accessibility to the Internet can be a source of education and empowerment for women, nonetheless, many women are bereft of this enabler to education, and hence, continue to live their lives the way they always have and are resigned to being a 'lesser human being' than men. Gender inequality continues to persist and be all pervasive.

Taking cognizance of the importance of education and knowledge to combat the scourge of the lack of empowerment and gender inequality, the Inner Wheel Clubs of Subang Selangor and Alor Setar organised two timely webinars – one on how to develop strong empowered women and the other on coping with depression, one of the key reasons for the lack of empowered feelings among women.

The above webinar was conducted by Sitpah Selvaratnam, an eminent advocate and an international arbitrator. Her talk on 'Strong Women in a Challenging World' was very apt to address the despondent situation that many women find themselves in. There is now more isolation and loneliness and this has significantly affected the overall mental well-being, specifically of women and girls, who are more vulnerable.

Sitpah stressed that **women have to realise that they have higher emotional intelligence and an inbuilt ability to lead, manage conflicts and build positive relationships.** Strong women can face their emotions with courage and self-assuredness and know that kindness and compassion are strength, which stem from having the right attitude to face adversities and daunting challenges.

It is important, Sitpah continued, that despite the vulnerability of women and girls, they have a strong ability to face the emerging challenges with their inner strength, and this in turn, will emit positive energy, gratitude and hope. **Empowered women can have a rippling effect on their family and society, and ultimately, the nation**. Women can find formidable courage and confidence even in troubled times, which can only be possible if they feel empowered enough to do so.

SUFFERING IN SILENCE: COPING WITH DEPRESSION Inner Wheel Club of Alor Setar



Numbers....

- The total number of people living with depression in the world is 322 million.
 Women are 70% more likely than men to suffer from depression (NIMH)
- 30% of college students report having depression, impacting their school functioning (Newsumek)

Recognising the mounting levels of depression, which lead women to feeling worthless, Dr Tesini Paramannantha Veloo, a psychiatrist, delivered a talk on coping with **depression**, one of the key factors which has led to women feeling disempowered.

Depression can be very debilitating, draining one's energy and hopes, and often, making it difficult to take that first small step towards recovery. When one feels depressed, the tendency is to withdraw, isolate and keep away from even close family members and friends.

Although taking the first step may be the hardest, like relaxing, going for a walk, reaching out for help, listening to music, etc., practicing these simple but positive steps day-by-day, can lift the dense fog of depression people can find themselves in. Dr Tesini said that if people feel depressed, they need to do things that relax and energise them. This may not lift depression immediately nor entirely, but it will ultimately make people feel more upbeat and energetic. **Once people with depression identify the destructive thought patterns that are causing the symptoms, and deal positively with it, they can be well on their way to feeling more empowered and attuned to a balanced perspective of life.**

MYTHILI: AN EMPOWERED WOMAN Inner Wheel Club of Subang

IWC of Subang had been assisting a housewife, Mythili, who had been finding it difficult to manage her household expenses as her husband had lost his job due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Upon reflection, the Club felt that it would not be of much help to her to merely help her sporadically with cash donations every time she asked and decided that there must be a way for her to be more self-sustaining. It was then decided that Mythili should empower herself and learn to stand on her own two feet, as she was young and healthy – all she needed was a morale booster to be more confident of her own capabilities.

After a discussion with her, the idea slowly sank in as she realised that she could use her cooking skills to open up a food stall. To start her off with her business, IWC of Subang contributed towards the purchase of the necessary equipment. Following this, she set up a stall to sell breakfast items and soft drinks. It only took a month for her efforts to be rewarded, and Mythili is now earning a tidy sum which comes in handy to defray her household expenses. This resourceful housewife is happy and self-assured. For IWC of Subang, **her story is one of perseverance**, **a never give-up attitude and determination, all of which are key ingredients to succeed**. The Club feels very fulfilled in meeting one of the goals set by IIW President Ebe Martines, by empowering a woman to take charge of her life, and in the process, of the family members who depend on her.

No amount is too little. Let us come together to do our bit so that we can build a nation of strong empowered women towards building a stronger world for our children and the future generation. Empowered women contribute to the well-being and prosperity of the nation. There must therefore be a more focused and concerted effort to identify and redress imbalances so that women have more control over their own lives, and in turn, feel empowered to forge ahead with renewed enthusiasm and vigour.

A beautiful legacy to the world

On 15 November 1923, twenty-seven Rotary wives, led by Mrs. Golding discussed the possibility of forming an independent ladies' group run on Rotary lines. Mrs Golding was a nurse, businesswoman and the wife of a Rotarian. At that time, wives of Rotarians in many cities and towns were concerned for public



welfare, and had been volunteering in the background, giving their time and energies to help in any service being undertaken by their menfolk.

The objects of the Club, they explained, would be to foster friendship and to offer much more in the way of service. The next meeting on 10 January 1924 marked the actual commencement of the **Inner Wheel Club of Manchester**. Mrs Golding became the first President.

In 1928, with the formation of four more clubs, the "No. 5 Inner Wheel District Committee" was formed. Now known as **Inner Wheel District 5**. On 6 May 1934, there were 79 clubs in 8 Districts and they formed The Association of Inner Wheel Clubs in Great Britain and Ireland", fondly called to this day as the "**79ers**". Mrs Golding became the first President. She passed on in 1939, having seen the formation of the 100th club.

Formation of International Inner Wheel

Based on the same objects, several clubs were formed overseas:

- 1931 Ballarat, Australia
- 1935 Bergen, Norway
- 1936 Napier, New Zealand
- 1938 Port Elizabeth, South Africa
- 1943 Winnipeg, Canada
- 1946 Apeeldom, The Netherlands
- (formerly Holland)
- 1946Singapore (former British Crown Colony)

With the inclusion of overseas clubs, the **Association** of Inner Wheel Clubs was formed in 1947. Growth continued speedily, to name a few:

- 1948 Ipoh, Malaysia (formerly Malaya)
- 1948 District 26. Six clubs in The Netherlands. The first overseas district to be formed.
- 1949 Manila, The Philippines
- 1949 Filipstad, Sweden
- 1951 Stamford-Hobart, USA
- 1955 Ahmedabad, India
- 1960 Accra, Ghana
- 1960 Valenciennes, France

On 1 July 1967, under Mrs Lavender Weightman as President, the **International Inner Wheel** was formed. National Governing Bodies as an umbrella of districts were also structured in 1967. Our organisation has now over 104,000 members in nearly 4,000 clubs and growing currently in 100 countries.

Celebrating "World Inner Wheel Day" (also called **Inner Wheel Day**)



Sitting in Berners Hotel (London) late one night, Vice-President Helena Foster said to the Executive, including Secretary Adelaide Lack and Treasurer Margaret Cross, "I would like to have one day in the year when all Inner Wheel members would do something special and think of their fellow members around the world." She continued, "...but as well as thinking of

other members, to do some kind of personal service." In her book "The First 25 Years", Helena wrote, "This was discussed and it was decided the day should be January 10th (our foundation day in 1924). On that day in each year all members throughout the world of International Inner Wheel should unite in personal service and celebration, the idea being one of unity. That night, we had an embryo **World Inner Wheel Day.**"

President Helena Foster (1969-1970) then wrote a letter to all clubs worldwide in which was said, "I am sure that there are inspiration and encouragement to be gained by the knowledge that your fellow members throughout the world are at that moment joined together to extend service and friendship."

52nd Inner Wheel Day 10 January 2022 IIW PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

After the first Meeting held on 15 November 1923 at a Cooling room at Herriot's Turkish Baths, 27 Rotary wives held a second meeting at the Social Club in Lower Mosley Street, Manchester, and officially formed the Manchester Club, President Mrs Margarette Oliver Golding and Mrs W.A. Nixon as first Secretary and Treasurer. The objects of the Club would be to foster friendship and encourage personal service.

Excerpt from the Minutes of the second Meeting on 10 January 1924: "The name of the Club to be the Inner Wheel. Meetings to be held on alternate Tuesday and to continue throughout the year". The meeting marked the commencement of Inner Wheel!

The first District IW No. 5 was formed in 1928, the Association was born in 1934 and 36 years later Mrs Helena Foster, IIW President 1969-70 had the brilliant idea to suggest to hold Inner Wheel Day annually on January 10th. She wrote a letter to all Club Presidents asking them to link together in action on January 10th to extend service and friendship.

This year 2022, the 98th Inner Wheel Year, the Inner Wheel Day will be the 52nd since its creation.

Sharing the initiative taken by my predecessor Helena, the second IIW President, in my capacity as the 54th

IIW President, I sent a letter to National Representatives, Districts and Non-Districted Clubs, asking them to support, in the first ten days of January 2022 ending on the date of the Inner Wheel Day, the **"Wheel Can Cerv"** campaign launched by the Association of Inner Wheel Clubs in the Philippines Inc. to help eradicate cervical cancer, thus honouring the first priority of my Presidential Theme "Pink First": Women's Health. "Women helping Women" will then result into "Women Saving Women". But what I have just written to you was possible thanks to the farsightedness of our Founder Mrs Margarette Oliver Golding, the wife of a Manchester Rotarian, a capable business woman, a great philantropist and an excellent speaker. She worked for Inner Wheel from 1923 until 1939, the year of her death, after having seen the 100th Club formed. Since 2000, her name has been honoured by the inauguration of the Margarette Golding Award, in the form of a floral brooch, a marguerite, given to Inner Wheel Members or Members of the general public for highly commendable service on a regular basis in the community, implying personal sacrifice for the benefit of others. It was decided at the 11th Convention in Stockholm in 2000.

The merit of Mrs Golding was to breathe life into a new organisation, to guide it throught its formative stages and to see it solidly established.

On 17 June 2014, an asteroid was called "Golding" and dedicated to Margarette thanks to the Club of Torino Europea, District 204, Italy.

In April 2010, when I was the 26th Chairman of District 206, Italy, with a few Officers and husbands belonging to my District, I visited the Inner Wheel Club of Manchester, the Founder Club, a visit that I considered as a pilgrimage that every IW member should make once in her life.

The initial plan was to hold a large gathering in Hafnarfjörður but due to stricter COVID-19 measures in Iceland, it had to be changed to an online video conference. The event was a great success made even better with the help of many fantastic guests.

District Chairman Guðlaug Ásgeirsdóttir, a member of the Inner Wheel Club of Hafnarfjordur, welcomed the guests. Special guests were International Inner Wheel President Ebe Panitteri Martines, Iceland's First Lady Eliza Reid, and the Director of The Women's Shelter Sigþrúður Guðmundsdóttir.

DC Guðlaug gave a presentation of the activities of Inner Wheel in Iceland. She related that there are six clubs and about 150 members. The work has been difficult in these last years due to the pandemic as there could only be a few gatherings, although Zoom calls were plentiful.

In her speech, First Lady Eliza Reid introduced her newly released book 'Secrets of the Sprakkar' (published in Icelandic, end of 2021). 'Sprakkar' in Icelandic means 'female trailblazers'. She had interviewed various women from different levels of society who had a lot to say, each touching upon a variety of topics such as gender difference, careers, motherhood, and more. The book paints a vivid image of modern Icelandic society, its advantages and disadvantages, and the current status of equality issues.

First Lady Eliza also spoke about her life-changing experiences which included emigrating from Canada to lceland and becoming the First Lady of lceland. This was very interesting and invited a lively discussion of her new book. It is worth mentioning that an English version of the book is due for release in early 2022.

IIW President Ebe was next to address the guests. She thanked the members for the invitation and praised their work during these trying times. She covered the history of Inner Wheel and mentioned some women which had carried out significant work for the organisation. In particular, she highlighted Margarette Golding who founded Inner Wheel in Manchester in 1924.

She also discussed various projects which IIW emphasises, including the project "Wheel Can Cerv" which promotes the immunisation of young girls against cervical cancer. It is worth mentioning that 11-year-old girls have been immunised against cervical cancer since 2014 in Iceland.

Director Sigþrúður related about the Shelter's activities in Reykjavík and Akureyri, including a halfway house which was recently initiated.

Two graduates from the Hafnarfjörður Music School performed to great acclaim at the conference. Lovely music by fantastic musicians.

DC Guðlaug ended the conference with the sentiment that better times were hopefully ahead so operations could flourish.



10 January 2022 is Inner Wheel Day and Inner Wheel Clubs all over the world are celebrating the significance of the founding of the first Inner Wheel Club in Manchester, England on 10 January 1924 and to honour the memory of Margarette Golding, the founder of Inner Wheel, by performing some acts of service and friendship.

This year's celebration is particularly poignant and meaningful for **District 386** having experienced the onslaught of Super Typhoon Odette (International name Typhoon Ri) last 16 December 2021. Twenty days after Typhoon Odette wrought havoc in Metro Cebu and Southern Cebu, causing major to severe damages to their homes, without electricity, water, gasoline, and means of communication.

In the midst of this unfortunate situation and in the context of service to humanity—healing and rebuilding—the Inner Wheel Clubs of the Philippines Inc ("IWCPI") District 386, in spite of the fact that many of its members are also in the process of recovering, initiated its Operation Paglingap (Operation Care) for the typhoon victims in Lapu-Lapu City and Cebu City. Sacks of rice and gallons of water were distributed to 200 families in Barangay Soong, Lapu-lapu City and 15 families in Barangay Sambag, Cebu City.

After two years of media alert on the COVID-19 pandemic, which unfortunately has caused so many deaths, the service proposed by IIW President Ebe Panitteri Martines reminds us that women can also die of other terrible diseases.

She has brought our attention to cervical cancer, a disease affecting women worldwide, especially in developing countries where prevention and vaccinations are rarely practised. The leading cause is by the human papillomavirus (HPV). The serious alarm came from the Inner Wheel Clubs in the Philippines. In Europe, cervical cancer is the fourth highest among the most common cancers.

The gathering was coordinated by the Presidents of the three Inner Wheel Clubs in Trento, District 206, Italy: President Angela Mazza Colella (Inner Wheel Club of Trento), President Loredana Bettonte Defant (Inner Wheel Club of Trento Castello) and President Carmen Sacchiero Ballotta (Inner Wheel Club of Rovereto).

The Clubs agreed to bring this vital issue to the attention of the local public, by highlighting the data published by the Italian Ministry of Health. These data show that in District 206, vaccinations against HPV had reached a significant coverage among the young population in recent years, varying between 65% and 75%. However, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the percentages of vaccinations and control tests have suffered a dangerous drop in the last two years. Therefore, it appears worthwhile and necessary to raise the voice on this issue and create awareness to foster prevention and increase vaccination coverage, especially among young people.

The initiative of the three Inner Wheel Clubs has been published by the leading local newspapers, "L'Adige" and the two online newspapers, "L'Adigetto" and "Opinione". We hope local authorities, who have always been attentive to health monitoring, will respond to our solicitation to resume the awareness and vaccination campaigns to prevent cervical cancer.

District 244 in Turkey carries out HPV vaccinations for university students

"Vaccination" has been a bit of a problematic subject recently, after COVID-19 in Turkey. Unfortunately, the HPV vaccine is not supplied for free by the government.

President of the **Inner Wheel Club of Ege**, Ekin Kalender together with club member Professor Dr Ege Nazan Tavmergen Göker had long discussions about the subject. The Professor works in the Department of Gynaecology, Obstetrics & Reproductive Medicine of Ege University. It was decided to target the female students of the Faculty of Medicine who have not been vaccinated due to lack of money. These students will be the medical doctors of the near future and the ones to be well aware of the importance of the vaccination. The Pr

The project was presented in December 2021 to National Representative Siren Toksoy, District Chairman Melek Güsar, District Vice-Chairman İlgin Günöy and the Executive Committee of the Inner Wheel Club of Ege. Following that, online talks were held with the students under the charge of Professor Dr Aysun Doğan, Head of the Department of Psychology at Ege University. The first dose were administered on 7 January 2022. The second and third doses have been scheduled for March and June. IWC Ege Member, Özlem Sayıner, a pharmacologist, assisted with supplies of vaccines through a medical company.

After the message of International Inner Wheel President Ebe Panitteri Martines, calling for the clubs worldwide to increase awareness about HPV, President Bijen Tösgel of the **Inner Wheel Club for İzmir** contacted the President of the Inner Wheel Club of Ege to join forces for a better impact in helping the women of İzmir.

President Bijen Tösgel immediately organised an informative zoom meeting about HPV for forty members of District 244 on 5 January 2022. Dr Şebnem Altunyurt, a gynecologist and new member of the Inner Wheel Club of İzmir was the speaker. She briefly explained the medical aspects of HPV and vaccination.

Saying "Pink First", İzmir Inner Wheel Club will be organising more meetings for the mothers in March and April. Professor Dr Aysun Doğan and Dr Şebnem Altunyurt will be the speakers, explaining both psychological and medical aspects of HPV.

In Turkey, prevalance of cervical cancer is approximately 5.3 in every 100.000 women. For women, cervical cancer is the second most fatal type after breast cancer. HPV infection, is seen predominantly among women between the ages 15 and 24. Therefore university students, a high risk group to catch HPV infection and go through complications, is an important group which deserve to be informed as to the diagnosis, treatment and vaccination of this disease. Moreover, although there are

many sexual hygiene education programs for various age groups (adolescents and adults) have been developed, it is observed that programs oriented towards university students are insufficient and scarse. This is the reason an educational programme for university students under this topic will be organized. In this programme, information will be provided as to the risk factors (such as sexual intercourse towards the first menstural period (menarche), having active sexual life in young age, smoking habits, having a partner with polygynist practice), preventive measures and vaccination. Regarding the fact that university students after graduation assume an informative and pioneering role in society, it is contemplated that working with this group has high significance. Moreover it must be remembered that the university students are potential parents and are disposed to use these information for their children in future.
